Introduction:

For IB Visual Arts, mixed media is more than an experiment; it is a way to expand artistic intention, connect with global practices, and show that materials themselves can carry meaning.



Why Mixed Media?

Mixed media matters because it:

- Breaks Boundaries: Combines painting, collage, textiles, photography, sculpture, and digital art.
- Carries Symbolism: Materials themselves become part of the message (recycled paper, fabric scraps, found objects).
- Encourages Risk-Taking: IB values experimentation, and mixed media shows evidence of creative courage.
- Connects Cultures: Many cultures traditionally combine media — from textile art to architectural decoration.

When we experiment, we embrace happy accidents and discover new voices in our art.




Robert Rauschenberg (USA):

Rauschenberg created artworks inspired by each country's visual and cultural environment. These works were exhibited alongside his existing pieces to spark cross-cultural dialogue and mutual understanding. The aim was not just art-making, but using art as a bridge for human rights and artistic freedom, particularly in countries where expression was suppressed.

Wangechi Mutu (Kenya/USA): Collage with magazine clippings, paint, and organic textures exploring identity and feminism. Known for collage paintings that combine magazine images, medical diagrams, fashion photos, and traditional African motifs into otherworldly female forms. Her figures often become hybridized, blending human, plant, animal, and mechanical parts.









Vik Muniz (Brazil): Works with chocolate, garbage, and unusual materials to recreate images.

Here are a few <u>experimental approaches</u> you can try:


• **Collage:** Layering paper, photographs, fabric, or text.

• **Assemblage:** Using 3D objects in a painting or sculpture.




















• **Photo Transfer:** Transferring images onto paper, canvas, or wood.











• **Texture Additions:** Mixing paint with sand, plaster, wax, or glue.







• **Hybrid Media:** Combining traditional techniques with digital edits or projections.





• Fabric & Thread: Embroidery, patchwork, or fabric collage integrated with paint.












Student Challenges

"Memory Collage" - Layers of Identity

Collect personal photos, found images, fabrics, or objects.

Combine them with paint or ink into a collage that tells a personal or cultural story.

Focus on contrast, layering, and intentional meaning.



IB Reflection Prompt: How do the materials themselves add to the story you want to tell?

Student Challenges

"Texture Experiment Board" – 5 Materials in 1 Work

- Create a sampler board with at least five unconventional materials (sand, fabric, recycled paper, thread, leaves, etc.).
- Combine them with acrylic, ink, or watercolor.
- Aim for variety in surface, texture, and layering.



IB Reflection Prompt: How does experimenting with unexpected materials change your process?

IB Reflection Prompts

- How do materials themselves change meaning in art?
- When does an object stop being "ordinary" and become symbolic?
- How do accidents or unexpected results influence creativity?
- How does experimentation help you grow as an artist, even if the outcome is not "perfect"?
