GLOBAL ISSUES SHORT VIDEO CREATION

Students work in teams to research a global issue. They will create a storyboard with a plan to address the issue, working collaboratively to develop a solution that is culturally responsive and considers the perspectives of diverse communities affected by the issue. This project incorporates the PBL framework's inquiry, student voice and choice, and critique and revision elements. The final product of the project will be a short video creation, featuring the entire research and the students' insights.

The objective and goal:

- 1. **Develop students' critical thinking skills:** Students will research and analyze complex global issues, such as climate change, poverty, or immigration, and develop a deep understanding of the causes and effects of these issues.
- 2. **Promote empathy and cultural understanding:** Students will develop an appreciation and understanding of diverse cultural perspectives related to the global issues being studied, and consider how different communities are impacted by these issues.
- 3. **Encourage collaboration and communication:** Students will work collaboratively in teams to develop a plan to address the global issue they have chosen, communicating effectively with each other to develop a solution that is culturally responsive and takes into account the perspectives of diverse communities affected by the issue.
- 4. **Foster civic engagement:** Students will develop a sense of responsibility and agency, recognizing their role in addressing global issues and promoting social change.
- 5. **Showcase learning through a public product:** Students will present their research and solutions to the community, showcasing their learning and promoting awareness of the global issue they have studied.



HOW THE PROJECT WILL WORK:

- 1. Launch: Begin the project by introducing the essential or driving question to guide students' inquiry. For example: "How can we address the issue of climate change, while also promoting cultural understanding and empathy?". At this phase, students will receive a list of the top 15 most concerning issues in 2023, and select what cause they will work with. You can find the list at the end of this document.
- 2. **Inquiry:** Students will research and analyze the global issue they have chosen, gathering information from various sources. At the end of this document, you can also find what resources students can find helpful and trustworthy information.
- 3. **Student Voice and Choice:** Students will have the opportunity to choose how to find images and footage specific to represent the global issue, focused on the research conducted. They can use the school campus, local community, and surrounding area to take pictures, record videos and take notes.
- 4. **Collaboration:** Students will work in teams to develop a solution to the global issue, drawing on their individual strengths and working together to develop a culturally responsive solution. At this phase, students can conduct interviews with staff members, teachers, family members, and any other figure relevant to their search.

6 - **Critique and Revision:** Students will present their solutions to the class and teacher, which will help them to create the videos and put together the relevant information for the research. Video editors like Canva and Veed.lo are free and very intuitive to use during this part of the process, but any video editor can be used. After this part, students can work on making revisions based on this feedback.

7- Public Product: Students will present their final product to the broader community, showcasing their learning and raising awareness of the global issue they have studied. This may take the form of a Movie Night at school, or sharing the videos on the school's social media.

8- Reflection: Students will reflect on their learning and the impact of their project, considering how their understanding of the global issue has evolved, and how they have developed their critical thinking, empathy, collaboration, and communication skills. Students can use the

self-reflection form for this part of the project.





TOP 15 MOST CONCERNING GLOBAL ISSUES:

- 1. **Climate Change:** The Earth's temperature is increasing because of human activities. We can help reduce it by using clean energy sources and making changes to our daily habits.
- 2. **Environmental Conservation:** Protecting nature and wildlife by preventing pollution and preserving natural habitats.
- 3. **Human Rights:** Everyone should be treated fairly and equally, no matter what they look like, where they come from, or what they believe in.
- 4. **Poverty:** When people do not have enough money to meet their basic needs, such as food, shelter, and healthcare.
- 5. **Global Health:** Keeping people healthy and safe around the world by preventing diseases, promoting healthy habits, and ensuring access to healthcare.
- 6. **Education:** Learning and acquiring knowledge, skills, and values through schooling or other means.
- 7. **International Development:** Helping countries that are less developed to grow and prosper by improving infrastructure, providing resources, and promoting economic growth.
- 8. **Refugee Crisis:** People who have had to leave their homes because of war, persecution, or other dangers.

- 14. **Cultural Exchange:** Learning about and sharing ideas, beliefs, and values with people from different cultural backgrounds, building understanding and respect.
- 15. **Disaster Relief:** Helping people who are affected by natural or human-made disasters, providing resources and support to rebuild and recover.

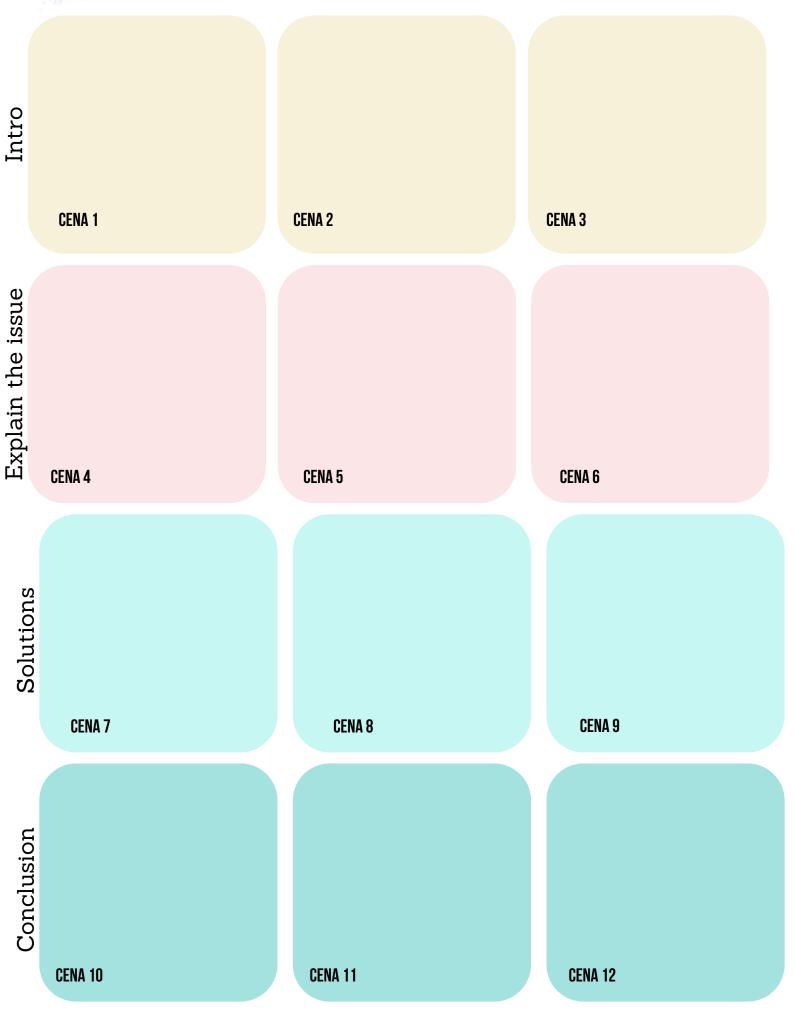
