Questions to Evaluate Your Curriculum for Multicultural Education



If you want to assure that your classroom is becoming the workspace that you will be proud of, make sure to reflect on the following questions and make the adjustments you need.


- 1. Does your curriculum include diverse perspectives and voices from different cultures, ethnicities, and backgrounds?
- 2. Are your students exposed to different cultural practices, traditions, and values?
- 3. Are stereotypes and biases challenged and addressed in your curriculum?
- 4. Is your curriculum inclusive of different learning styles and abilities?
- 5. Does your curriculum promote critical thinking, empathy, and understanding of social justice issues?
- 6. Are your students taught to respect and appreciate cultural diversity?
- 7. Are your students provided with opportunities to engage with and learn from diverse communities?
- 8. Are alternative resources and materials that can help you to launch multicultural education in the classroom?
- 9. Is your curriculum aligned with state or national standards for multicultural education?
- 10. Can you conduct this self-evaluation and put an action plan in place to ensure that the curriculum remains current and relevant?

- 1. Start with an open mind and a willingness to learn and grow.
- 2. Learn about the diverse backgrounds and experiences of your students.
- 3. Evaluate your curriculum for inclusivity and diversity.
- 4. Incorporate multicultural resources, such as books, videos, and art, into your lessons.
- 5. Develop multicultural lesson plans that highlight diverse cultures, languages, and perspectives.
- 6. Build connections with your students' home countries through guest speakers and cultural celebrations.
- 7. Provide language support through bilingual materials and language classes.
- 8. Encourage open communication and create a safe space for students to share their perspectives and experiences.

To avoid any uncomfortable situations, we want to help you create an environment where all of your students feel seen, heard, and valued. So take a look at our list of what not to do, and get ready to take your first steps towards a more inclusive classroom where everyone can thrive!

- 1. Don't assume you know everything about a particular culture or community. Be open to learning and researching new information.
- 2. Don't use stereotypes or generalizations when discussing cultures or communities. It's important to recognize the diversity and individuality within each group.
- 3. Don't tokenize or exoticize students from diverse backgrounds. Instead, treat them as individuals with their own unique experiences and perspectives.
- 4. Don't ignore or dismiss the contributions of diverse individuals throughout history. It's important to incorporate diverse perspectives and contributions in all subject areas.
- 5. Don't shy away from discussing difficult topics related to social justice and equity. It's important to create a safe space for students to share their experiences and learn from each other.
- 6. Don't ignore the language needs of students who are English language learners. Provide support and resources to help them succeed in the classroom.
- 7. Don't only rely on textbooks and standardized curriculum. Incorporate a variety of resources and materials to provide a more diverse and inclusive learning experience.
- 8. Don't assume that all students from diverse backgrounds have the same experiences or perspectives. Be open to individual differences and perspectives.
- 9. Don't wait for special occasions or events to celebrate diversity. Incorporate multicultural themes and celebrations throughout the year.
- 10. Don't forget that multicultural education is an ongoing process. It requires continuous learning, reflection, and adaptation to create a more responsive and inclusive classroom environment.
