Central to my pedagogy are the Eight Studio Habits of Mind—develop craft, engage and persist, envision, express, observe, reflect, stretch and explore, and understand art in community. These principles allow students to move beyond technique, encouraging them to reflect critically on their process, explore interdisciplinary connections, and approach their work with both rigor and curiosity.

In higher education settings, I place particular emphasis on critique and self-reflection. I design courses that challenge students to analyze their work and the work of others, drawing connections between personal narratives and broader artistic movements. Students are exposed to both historical and contemporary art practices, with a strong focus on global perspectives and cultural authenticity.

Ultimately, my goal is to help students of all levels engage deeply with the creative process, recognize the role of art in shaping society, and grow into artists and thinkers who are technically skilled, culturally informed, and conceptually strong.
